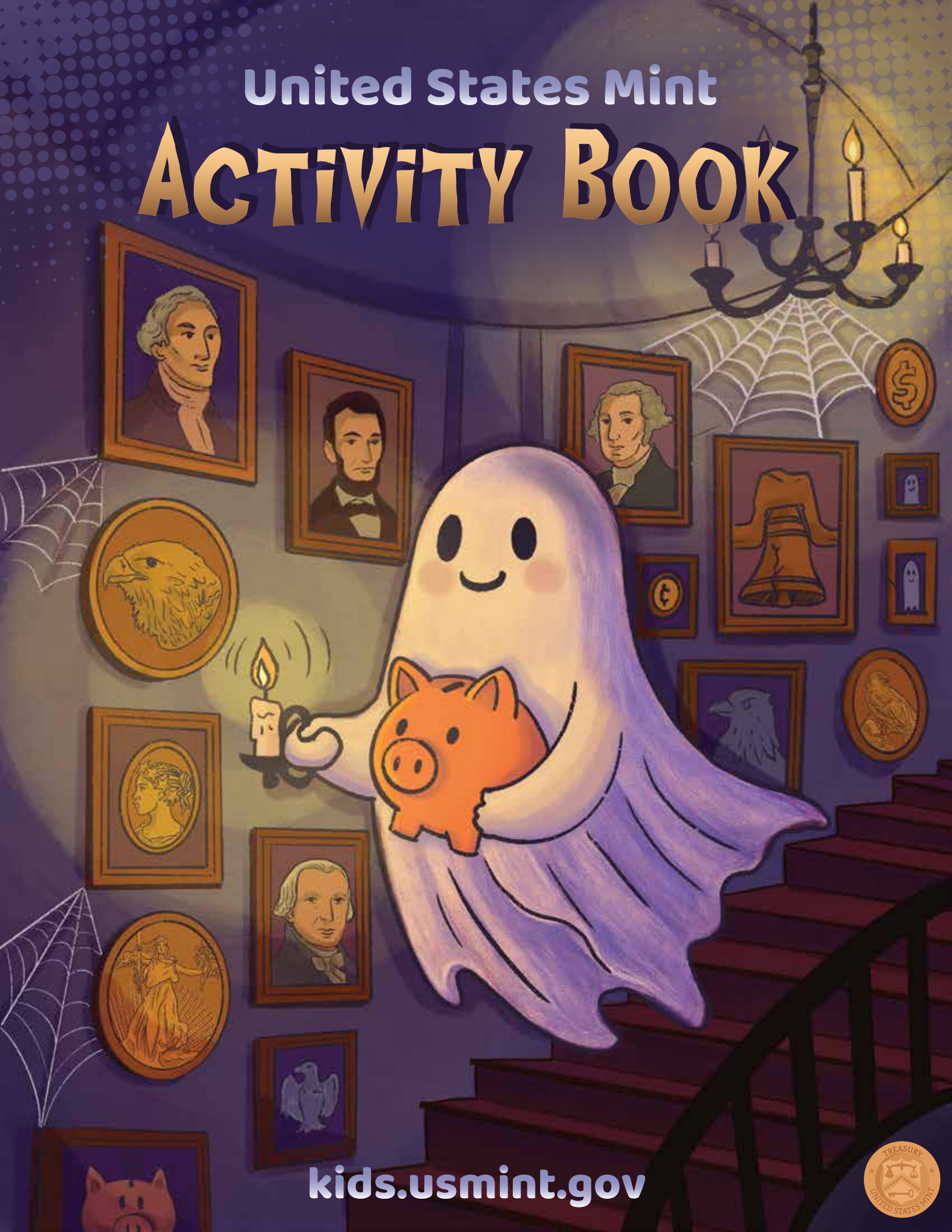

Where is the United States Mint?

The U.S. Mint has six locations around the country. Learn about each of them below.

Denver Mint
Makes circulating and uncirculated sets, coin dies, and stores gold and silver. Provides public tours!

San Francisco Mint
Makes commemoratives and collectible coin sets.

Fort Knox Bullion Depository
Stores gold and precious metal bullion reserves.

Philadelphia Mint
Makes circulating and commemorative coins, uncirculated sets, medals, and coin and medal dies. Also gives public tours!

Mint Headquarters
Responsible for policies, marketing and other business related to Mint operations.

West Point Mint
Makes commemorative, uncirculated, proof, and bullion coins. It also stores precious metals.



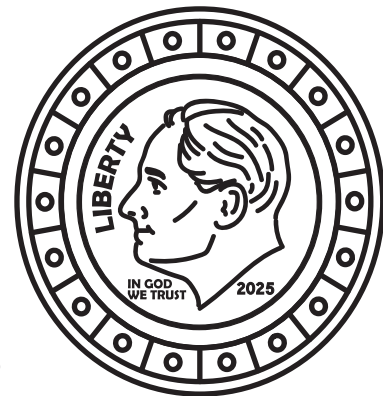

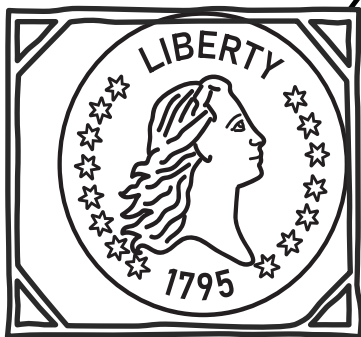
Coin designs have changed throughout history. Our coins can show people, symbols, words, or mythical figures. Which designs have you seen before? Color them!



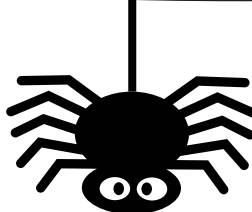
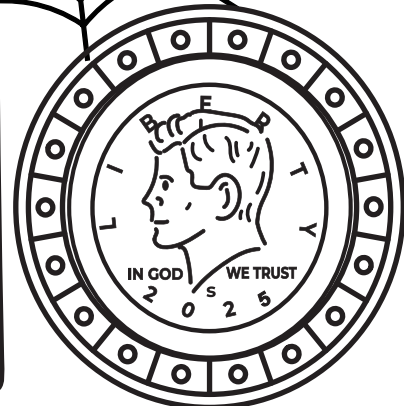

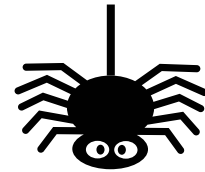


Through the maze he likes to roam, help the ghost find his spooky home!

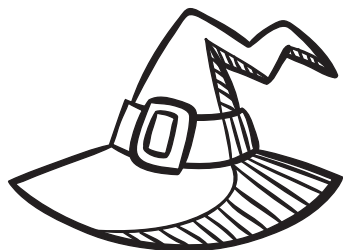

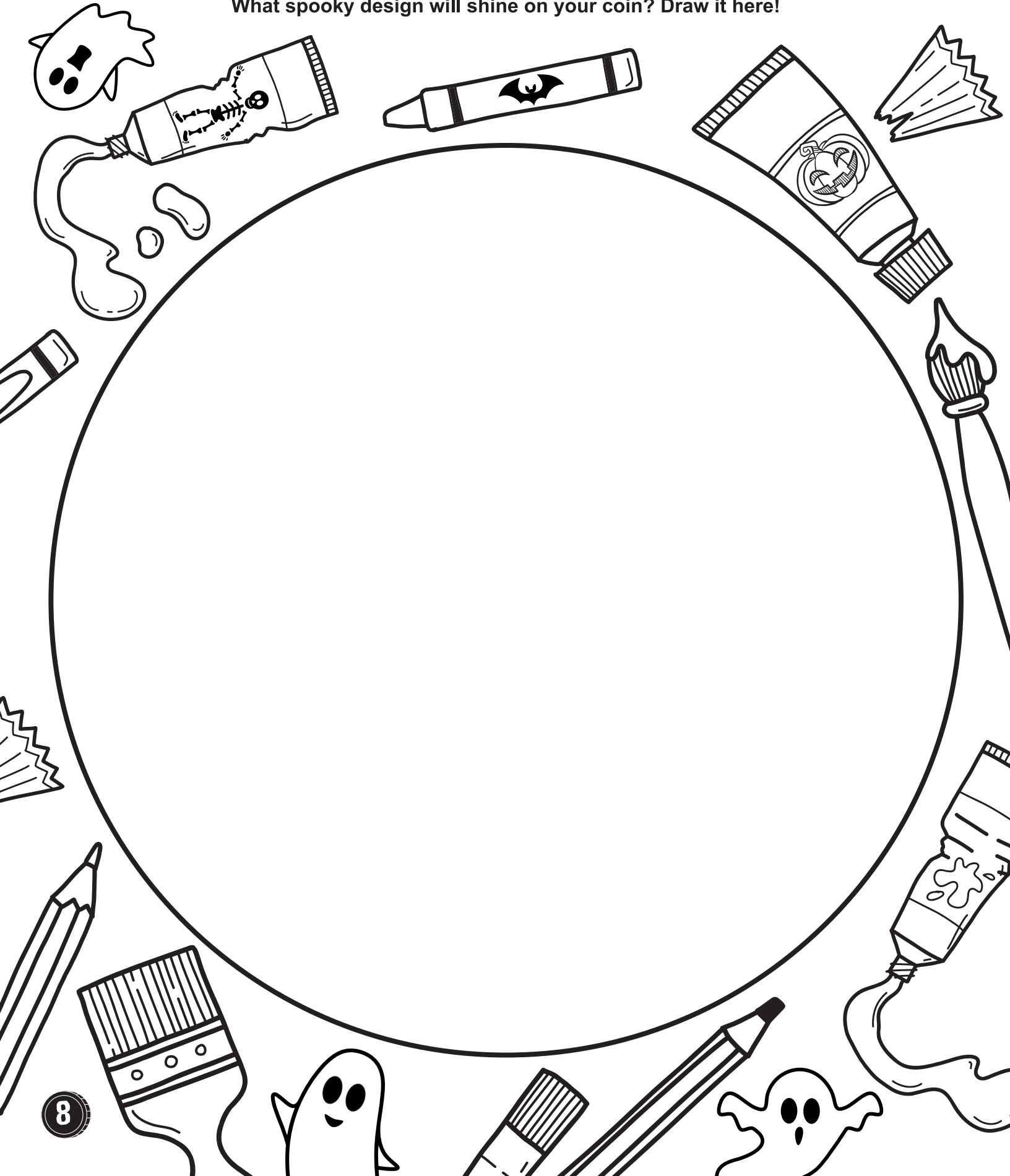
